Father and mother's home was near Homer, Louisiana. They and their five children moved to Grayson County, Texas, in December, 1869. There five more children were born to them. Mother was always a true friend in time of need, always willing to nurse the sick, a true, loving christian mother and was faithful in keeping the home fires burning.

Father was the best of fathers, Christian, and friend. He also took great interest in the good of the community, county and state. He served his county as commissioner for 4 terms (8

years). He had been clerk of the Baptist church, of which he was a member, for 45 years. He fell dead at his post of duty as treasurer/secretary of the Baptist Association, which was being held near Van Alstyne, Texas, Aug. 13, 1908. He would have been 72 on Nov. 4, 1908. Mother never seemed to enjoy life after the passing of father. She passed away Feb. 27, 1911—age: 71 years and 1 day.

Edward Sanders was born Nov. 4, 1836 in North Carolina. His father was Lee Hilliard Sanders, his mother's name was Matilda Birmingham Sanders. Father has one sister (Aunt Mat) Sanders Baucum; three brothers, Thomas, Billie, and Alex, one half-brother, Charles Sanders,—all are dead except Charles. He would be 82 years of age. Pa was Scotch-Irish.

Julia Margaret Caroline Bollinger Sanders was born near Homer, La., Feb. 26, 1840. Her mother's name was Emeline Bollinger. Grandmother's maiden name was either Mills or Goodson. One was Grandmother's maiden name and the other was great-grandmother's maiden name. Mother had cousins by the name of Dove. Mother's father's name was Richard Bollinger. He was German or Dutch. I know very little about mother's people. She had one half-sister, Casandre. I can't think of her surname, I'll write and ask Mattie, she'll remember.

I correspond with cousin Stella Haynes (father's niece) of Haynesville, La. Maybe she can tell me about mother's people. Grandmother Bollinger left her husband only four months before mother was born. She knew him only about six weeks when they were married, when they separated he left Louisiana. Father's father's family came to Louisiana. when he was 19 years of age in about 1855.

He married Permelia Ann Taylor Nov 7, 1872. Parents were Berryman or Berry Sanders and Naomi T. Williams. Gilbreth and Permelia had 11 children; all but two lived to see adulthood. They were: 1. Naomira M. (Oma), b. Jun 12, 1874 Perry Co., Tenn., married B.A. Kitchens and they lived in Kusuth, Alcorn Co., Miss.; 2. Berry N., b. Apr 30, 1878. It was said he died in his early 20s; 3. William (Bill) Thomas, b. Feb 23, 1880 Benton Co., Tenn. He married 1) Ann ? 2) Leola, (Ann's sister) in Texas; 4. Flora E., b Sept 7, 1882 Hickman Co., Tenn. She married a Bush, and then married again to Moses Duckworth Dec 10, 1916 in Bonaham, Fannin Co., Texas; 5. Ira Lee, b Apr 1885 Tenn. He married Roverta (Nanny)?. He was a Church of Christ preacher and last preached in Houston Texas, I believe; 6. Cora Adila, b. Jul 21, 1887 Tenn. Cora married Henry LaRue. They lived in Hugo, Okla.; 7. John Grover, b. Feb 2,

1890 Tenn. He married Emma Brown Windle on Nov 30, 1924. They lived in Lamasco close to Bonaham, Texas. He was also a Church of Christ preacher; 8. Bertha M., b. May 2, 1892 Miss. She married Guy Satterfield and lived in Hugo, Okla.; 9. Edith, b. Oct 1894 Miss. She was struck by lightning as a child. 10. Udora b ? (sometime before 1890). She died as a child and is believed to be buried at the old home place where there is a Sanders cem. in Beardstown, Perry Co., Tenn.; 11. Taylor Wallace, b Mar 22, 1897 Kossuth, Alcorn Co., Miss. He was my grandfather. He married Mildred Nancy Clary on Jul 18, 1924 in Bonaham, Fannin Co., Texas.

Gilbreth's wife Permelia died sometime between 1897 and 1990. Shortly after that he packed up eight of his children all except for the oldest (since she was married) and Berry and Udora since she had died and moved to Texas. He then went back to Miss. and Tenn. and died there we were told in family stories. So my grandfather, T. Wallace, was raised by the older brothers and sisters. Bryan in Texas. A baby died at birth and as far as I know there are three children living. Harvey Roy, Nona Zeula, and Mary Lee. Audrey Vera was born in 1889 and died at the age of eleven.

In 1892 they moved to the Indian Territory and about 1898 they moved to Wash., Ore., and on into Calif. where brother Elbert died in 1928—age 68. Sister Dora followed him in death a few years later. Both lived christian lives and were members of the Baptist Church. Dora was one of the sweetest persons I ever knew.

William Smith Sanders and Zora Ann Welch were married Dec. 1894 in Texas. They were the parents of Roy Clyde, Bertha, Beulah, Oma Lee, Geraldine, and Hellen. Zoe passed away several years ago.

Willie and Florence Mathews were married Dec. 31, 1933. Willie was 76 on Feb. 1, 1950.

Thomas E.E. Sanders and Miss Mollie McGinty were married on Jan. 1, 1889 by Rev. Hughey in Texas. One child, William Edward was born Nov. 12, 1889. Mollie passed away Dec. 24, 1889. T.E.E. Sanders and Bertie Nix were married Dec. 16, 1891 by Rev. Mansfield. They were the parents of five children: Madie Irene, Nov. 12, 1892; Thomas Virgil, Oct 21, 1894; Ernest Alvin, Feb 21, 1896; Mattie Sue, July 27, ?; Carl, Feb. 3, 1902. The Sanders Burial Grounds are in the Barnwell District of South Carolina

I have genealogies on four Sanders men who settled in Barnwell District, South Carolina, 1700s to 1800s: Nathaniel, b. abt. 1755-60, John (Black Jack), b. 11 Aug. 1764, William, b. 14 Feb 1765, and Moses, b. 1770. The DAR of Barnwell reported that Nathaniel and John are brothers as are William and Moses and that the two sets of brothers are cousins. Further, I have written a book (including photos) called *The Sanders Burial Grounds* about the place that some of these men and their descendants are buried.

The Sanders Burial Grounds is being printed this summer—using proceeds to

restore and protect this family burial site. Presently do not have a price on this book, but will announce later.

Facts about the four Sanders men: Nathaniel Sanders rode with Gen. Francis Marion's Brigade during the Revolutionary War. Nathaniel's son, John, Jr. (his uncle used Sr.) was married to an Indian, sister to a chief, and a covenant written in early 1800s to back up this fact. The four Sanders men's families married relatives (some 1st., 2nd., and 3rd. cousins). Finally, a great number of these four Sanders men's descendants fought in the Civil War and other wars. A Civil War veteran and descendant of William Sanders, Rev. R. W. Sanders, who did not die until the mid 1920s, left a manuscript and other vital family information.

I am a direct descendant of Nathaniel and John (cousins married cousins), and I have been working since 1993 to add to these four genealogies that was compiled by the late Mr. and Mrs. W. H. Manning of South Carolina who recorded early families of Barnwell District (now called Barnwell County), S.C.

Willing to share info or aid anyone who thinks they might be related to the Barnwell, S.C., Sanders. Would like to find out who Nathaniel Sanders' parents were and where they came from. Due to Sherman's fires in South Carolina during the Civil War, many records were destroyed, so I am interested if anyone has come across any of these four Sanders men. ■

Harve Sanders Must Have Been An Interesting Man

Stories about Harve Sanders, written down by great-grandson, Denis Racine Ratliff, 27 May 1996:

This is a story as told to me by Richard (Dick) Johnson. He sold insurance for many years for New York Life. I would pick him up and take him to the Lodge.

One night I said to him, "Uncle Dick, (that is what we always called him at the Lodge), did you ever know old man Harve Sanders?" I said he was my great grandfather. He laughed and said yeah and I can tell you a story or two about him.

One time he was postmaster at Little Pond. He didn't like the job and wanted to quit. He asked the postal department in Washington, D.C. to get a replacement for him. They just ignored him. A postal inspector came one day to check him out and he told him he was going to quit and to get a replacement. Time went on and nothing was said about a replacement. He decided he would just close the Post Office. He boxed up everything that belonged to the Post Office and took it to the Praise Post Office (now Elkhorn City) and mailed it to the Postal Department in Washington, D.C. and told them the Little Pond Post Office was closed because he had quit.

The second story told by Richard Johnson about Harve Sanders of Hellier, Ky:

He said the passenger train would come in about one o'clock during the day. Back then the train carried many passengers because this was about the only way to travel other than horseback. Usually there would be a large crowd gathered to see who was arriving because this was the most excitement during the day. Three people got off the train dressed in black representing some religious order. They walked up to Harve and asked him if he knew where the "Saints" (this is what they called their religious order) lived. Harve being quick at wit and mean at thought, said, yeah, yeah, come right out here and I will show you. They followed him and he pointed up to the other hill and said the only saints we have are right up there on that pint (point) and all 6 feet under. He had pointed to the cemetery.

This is a story as told to me (Racine Ratliff) by Charlie Moore, Shelby Gap,

Ky., when I met him early one morning in the street in Pikeville:

He said, let's see, your mother was a Sanders, her father was Nelse, this would make Harve Sanders your great grandfather. I want to tell you a story about Harve. He would come and stay all night with us as he was passing through. He claimed to be a very strong democrat. He said he was by himself walking through the woods one day when a big storm came up. The rain was a down pour, thunder and lightning was terrible. For protection he found a large hollow tree in which he could stand up. He said the thunder and lightning got worse, trees were swaying from the heavy winds and rain continued as a down pour and it was also turning dark. All of a sudden the old tree he was in began to squeak and move and before he

knew what was happening the tree had drawn completely closed and he could not get out. He was very scared and began to pray to the good Lord to let him escape this time. He began to think of the bad things he had done in his lifetime. The only thing he could think of was that he had voted one republican vote in the past. He prayed and prayed to the good Lord to let him out of the tree. He finally promised the Lord if he would let him escape he would never vote another republican vote. The thunder and lightning quit and the rain slowed down and all of the sudden the tree began to squeak and moan and twist and opened up so he could get out and the sky had cleared to almost bright day. He said if you want to live a long life to always vote straight as all good democrats should.

HARVE SANDERS AGE 91, IS DEAD

Widely Known, Served
Twice As Hellier
Police Judge

Harve Sanders, ninety-one years old, a life-long resident of Pike County, and twice police judge at Hellier, died at his home on Scott Avenue here at 10 o'clock Sunday night following a two-year period of ill health. Mr. Sanders was widely known throughout this section.

Born in Pike County, he was the son of Green and Rhoda Potter Sanders and spent many years in the Marrowbone Creek section, where he engaged in farming. His wife, Lucinda Castle Sanders, preceded him in death several years ago.

Surviving Mr. Sanders are two sons, Matt Sanders, of Pikeville, and Nelse Sanders of Hellier, and two daughters, Mrs. Sam Moore of Pikeville and Mrs. Love Childers of Ashcamp.

Funeral services were conducted Tuesday afternoon with Rev. Jake Gibson officiating. Burial was in the family cemetery there.

Another Opinion About Lawrence Saunders, the Martyr

Paul Saunders, 1417 Woody Creek Road, Matthews, NC 28105-8811 has sent a very detailed assessment of Lawrence Saunders' (the martyr) connection to Howard K. Sanders' family history (*A SANDERS FAMILY—Northants to Texas in 500 Years*) that was excerpted in four parts in issues numbers 7 through 10 of *Sanders Siftings*. Paul's comments are listed here with the reminder that all researchers can have opinions about their research and that of others. You are encouraged to share your opinions, research, and sources with other researchers.

... To think that he (Howard Sanders) located a family bible from the 1500s owned by someone in Virginia, located a Sanders in Harrington, and obtained a copy of an original document of the College of Heralds from 1588—all of which flies in the face of all other authors of Lawrence Saunders' life! He feels that his bible information is more reliable than records written many years after the fact, something I can agree with. However, Rev. John Foxe and Miles Coverdale, who preserved his letters and wrote his biography, were contemporaries of Lawrence. Fox wrote his book in 1563 and Coverdale wrote his in 1564! I feel that Howard has found a family connection to a Lawrence Saunders, but I don't think he was the Martyr—for many reasons. Let me explain:

First - Howard gives a date in 1510 for his birth, while J. Hixon Irving gives it as 1519 or 1520. The first firm date cited by Foxe is when Lawrence was a student at Eton and chosen to go to King's College in 1538. In the first case Lawrence would be 28 years old while in the other case he would be 18 or so. Eton has always been a school for boys, I believe, not men.

Second - Howard gives Lawrence six children while Foxe and all others give him one. The clergy were not allowed to marry until 1549 when Lawrence wed, and he went to prison in October 1553 for 15 months until his execution. Six children in four years is not possible, even when twins are included! Lawrence names only one child in his letters, his son Samuel, and makes provision for the care of his wife and Samuel only (covered later in more detail). If he had other children surely he would have provided for their care!

Third - the Saunders family to which Lawrence belonged were landed gentry and were visited by the King's Heralds and written up in several Visitations, twenty of which I have copies. None of these mentions any of the children cited by Howard. I thought Howard might have descended from Lawrence's uncle, also name Lawrence, but I don't see it now.

Howard starts Chapter II with the statement that Lawrence's brother Edward was the eldest of five sons of Thomas Saunders and that Edward had no children, which is incorrect. Thomas had 12 children at least, possibly 14.

I have information on all eight sons, except Blaston and William, and four of the six(?) daughters. Edward was the third son. He had one daughter, named Mary, who appears in the pedigree of Saunders of Newbold and is mentioned in the *Dictionary of National Biography*, of which Howard has seen only the "Compact Edition," apparently.

It's too bad that this book didn't come out before I moved from Williamsburg, where I lived for seven years before coming here. The Earl Gregg Swem Library of the College of William and Mary has a great genealogy collection, including a large amount on the Virginia Saunders, but I never checked the Saunders file because all of my family came from New England. I worked in this library often, however, and could have checked Howard's ancestry in Virginia that he admits is shaky. I lived in James City County, next to New Kent where he found the bible, also. If that bible is a Coverdale edition it must be very valuable. Coverdale (1488-1588) is credited with publishing the first English bible in 1537!

SAMUEL SAUNDERS

SON OF REV. LAWRENCE SAUNDERS

From several letters written by Lawrence, preserved by Miles Coverdale in *Certain Most Godly Letters*, 1564, and by Rev. John Foxe in *Actes and Monuments*, 1563, and reprinted in *British Reformers*, The Religious Tract Society, vol. 3:

LETTER VII. To mistress Lucy Harrington, a godly gentlewoman and friendly to him in his troubles: "... I have a poor wife and child, whom I love in the Lord, and whom I know you will tender for my sake, when I am departed hence."

LETTER VIII. Another letter to mistress Lucy Harrington: "... I make myself thus bold to lay this burden upon you, even the care and charge of my said poor wife I mean, to be unto her a mother and mistress, to rule and direct her by your discreet counsel."

LETTER XIII. Another letter to his wife, with a certain remembrance to master Harrington and master Hurland: "... the same God's blessing which we receive, shall also settle upon our Samuel; though we do shortly depart hence, and leave the poor infant. . ."

LETTER XIV. To his wife, M. Harrington, M. Hurland, etc.: "Remember God alway, my dear wife, and so shall God's blessing light upon you and our dear Samuel."

LETTER XV. A letter written to his wife, and others of the faithful, after condemnation to the fire; written the last of January, 1555, out of the Compter in Bread-street: "Be not careful, good wife; cast your care upon the Lord, and commend me unto him in repentant prayer, as I do you, and our dear Samuel, whom even at the stake I will offer, as myself, unto God."

LETTER XVI. To his wife a little before his burning: "God bless you, yea, he will bless thee, good wife, and thy poor boy also; only cleave thou unto him, and he will give thee all things."

From *Lawrence Saunders the Martyr, and His Friends*, by J. Hixon Irving, 1903?: "What became of Mrs. Saunders and her child Samuel after her husband's death is not known, as they are not mentioned in the pedigrees of the Saunders family nor in the Herald's visitations."

Correspond with Paul Saunders if you have questions about Lawrence—or Tobias Saunders, an ancestor of Paul's. ■
