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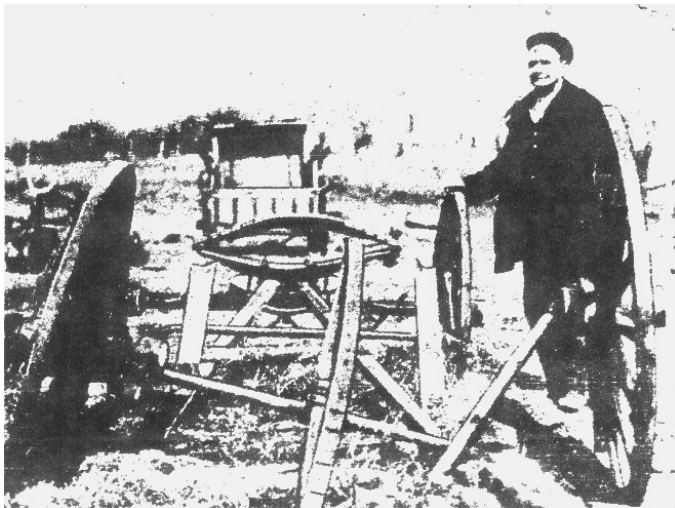

Did William Sanders of Beloit, Ohio, Build the First American Automobile?

The following, taken from *The Beloit (Ohio) Story*, 1963, was submitted by Bonnie D. Anderson, 410 S. Meriden Road, Cheshire, CT 06410-2926, <transit@juno.com>. William Sanders was a brother of Bonnie's grandfather.

History credits the year 1892 with the birth of the automobile, a gasoline powered machine. Fully a year before this time William Sanders was cavorting over the country roads, frightening cows, and generally disrupting the pastoral atmosphere with his land going "Fulton's Folly."

Sander's claim to the distinction of having invented the first auto is given a twinge of authenticity by the fact that like all true inventors, he never profited by his dream achievements.

It was about a year before the Chicago World's Fair, when Sanders first got the idea of making one of his buggies into a horseless carriage. He was visiting the Stratton Jump Seat Co. in Salem when he noticed a two-cylinder steam engine running a drill, but shortly after this company left Salem and he was unable to locate such an engine. In his search for an engine he

disclosed his plans to a printer in Salem, hoping that he would be able to help if he knew just what he needed it for. It was just a few days after this when folks began showing up at the house asking to see the horseless carriage, when Sanders denied having such an apparatus, they would laugh and wink and plead for a peak at it.

This was all very mysterious to Sanders until some one brought him a copy of the *Salem News* with a long story of his invention of the horseless carriage, with the prophecy that he would drive it to the World's Fair the next year.

This all served to help him make up his mind to build one. He began to assemble the parts he would need. A

boiler works in Alliance promised delivery on a boiler, which was to cost \$40.00, in three weeks, but after waiting they decided not to allow Sanders, who was such a likable fellow, to waste his money for such a foolish crazy notion, so he was forced to journey to Youngstown for his boiler. The special axles came from Cleveland. With a lot of attention on the body work the steam

wagon was ready to roll.

What a thrill it must have been that first time when water was taken aboard, the coal fire stoked into a steam raising energy, the gadgets all adjusted and then the wheels moved. Sanders stated "A man had to be pretty much of an engineer to run one of these affairs they

Mannie Jo Saunders Tells Story That Starts in Ga.; Goes To Cass Co., Texas

Mannie Jo Saunders was born Nov 3, 1847 probably at Ashton, N.C. (but could have been in Ga.); married May 9, 1867 to Steven Ridgley Rainey (CSA) at Ellaville, Schley Co., Ga.; died Jan 30, 1933 at Cass Co., Texas.

I am looking for any information about her family. We have been unable to find out the given names of her parents and we guess that her mother's maiden name was Smith, as inferred in the letter below. To date I have found nothing more than what is contained in this letter written by her daughter Vanessa Rainey Yarbrow in 1963. Vanessa passed away the next year. Two years after Mannie Jo Sanders and Steven Ridgley Rainey were married they moved to Cass Co., Texas.

From Vanessa's letter:

"Mannie is supposed to have dress up in her brother's uniform and gone with some friends to a cousin's house to trick her cousin. This was during the occupation of where ever by the Union Army. She was captured by Union Troops and they would not let her go until they were satisfied she was in fact a young girl.

"Her mother died when she was nine days old and her father when she was about nine years old.

"Know less of Mama (this is Mannie Sanders). She was named Precious Jo Mannie Sanders or Saunders. She had an older brother John, who was an officer in the army of the Confederacy (Leut. or Capt.). He was in charge of a bunch who cleaned up the battlefield at Bull Run. Two weeks after that battle was fought- hot summer- he got sick and died from this. They lived only 60 miles from Bull Run and could hear the canons during the battle.

"Mother had another brother - Uncle Jim who visited us - James Royle - I think. There were some half brothers, I think. Mamma lived with Uncle Zack Saunders when she was tiny. There she sat by an old blind lady, Aunt Bett Seat and was loved and taught by this lady. Aunt Betty was 109 when she died. She owned the land that Norfolk, Va. is built on, but no one took care of this for them, and I guess the Gov. finally took it over. Uncle Jimmie said they should have inherited this.

A Genealogist's Want List

Yep — I want ancestors with names like Rudimentary Montagnard or Melchizedick von Steubenhoffmannschild or Spetznatz Gianfortoni, not William Brown or John Hunter or Mary Abbott.

I want ancestors who could read and write, had their children baptized in recognized houses of worship, went to school, purchased land, left detailed wills (naming a huge extended family as legatees), had their photographs taken once a year — subsequently putting said pictures in elaborate isinglass frames annotated with calligraphic inscriptions, and carved voluble and informative inscriptions in their headstones. I want relatives who managed to bury their predecessors in established, still-extant (and indexed) cemeteries.

I want family members who wrote memoirs, who enlisted in the military as officers and who served in strategically important (and well documented) skirmishes. I want relatives who served as councilmen, schoolteachers, county clerks and town historians. I want relatives who 'religiously' wrote in the family Bible, journaling every

little event and detailing the familial relationship of every visitor.

In the case of immigrant progenitors, I want them to have arrived only in those years wherein passenger lists were indexed by National Archives, and I want them to have applied for citizenship, and to have done so only in those jurisdictions which have since established indices.

I want relatives who were patriotic and clubby, who joined every patrimonial society they could find, who kept diaries, and listed all their addresses, who had paintings made of their horses, and who dated every piece of paper they touched. I want forebears who were wealthy enough to afford, and to keep for generations, the tribal homestead, and who left all the aforementioned pictures and diaries and journals intact in the library.

But most of all, I want relatives I can find!!!

"The Saunders family lived in Rocky Mt., N.C. area. I used to address the letter to two small towns, Aventon and Ashland. John A. Saunders lived at the old house place. Mamma's mother's twin brother, Lee Smith, went to N.C. and got Mother after Uncle John's death, and took her to live with his family in Ga. Some of Uncle Lee Smith's family lived near Gladewater, and I visited with them one time (Columbus Smith's Family). I talked with Cousin Mary Smith a lot, but remember very little. She told me that General Sterling Price, high ranking Con. Gen, was a first cousin of Mother's. He saved Missouri for the south, and served two terms as Gov. of Missouri. Of course Mama did not know very much of her family, and never went back to N.C. after she moved to Ga."

were really complicated.”

The outward appearance of the wagon was similar to the Irish jaunting cart. He placed the boiler of his engine upright in the center of the body. The engine was dropped below the seat level and access to the seating arrangement was had from a short flight of steps that dropped down at the rear of the vehicle. Passengers sat sideways on two central seats facing the outside.

It took considerable foresight to navigate in this craft. Besides watching where he was travelling, the driver needs must look to his fires to keep his steam up, and then watch out for the places where he had cached coal and water in advance. Sanders did not start out for the World's Fair as was predicted, but was content to ride around the local country side; he was quick to recognize that steam was not the proper motive power for the horseless carriage, as it took too long to get anywhere due to so many stops for fuel and water.

However, several wealthy men offered to finance him if he would turn his carriage works into a horseless carriage works. Sanders stated “I knew the buggy days were doomed and we were on the threshold of a new era in transportation, but I also knew that steam was not the right kind of power.” Word got around of the proposal to change his business and the one man in the world to whom Sanders owed money - \$650.00 - was one who could not see ahead. Appearing at the house he declared he would foreclose if Sanders did not promise then and there to give up such ideas for the manufacture of such crazy things “that would never amount to shucks.” Thus he was forced to give up the idea that might have resulted in establishing a Detroit in Ohio.

The once noble vehicle has since rusted away and parts were scattered throughout the area in many farm yards and scrap piles. The carriage works was flattened by a tornado many years ago and all that is left of Beloit's near claim to fame in the memories of a few citizens.

Bill Sanders came to Beloit as a young man and at the age of 18 began to build the large home on the N.E. corner of Fifth and Main Streets, which was to be the home to which he brought his bride.

Through the years this corner was the

site of a number of enterprises. In 1895, a part of the house served as a grocery store with a barber shop on the first floor. The third floor was used as a meeting hall for many revival meetings and church groups. Public dances and roller skating was also an important part of the social life of the community and the third floor of the Sanders hall holds memories for many.

Sanders was well known as a buggy maker, taking much pride in the finish and fine lines. The Sanders children recall the buggy shop just north of the house, with the body works in the downstairs and the varnish room upstairs. No one was allowed to enter the building when painting was being done upstairs.

Bill and his brother Harvey also operated a saw mill at this site, northeast of the house. ■

He is listed in the 1850 Census of Jackson Co., Tenn. with wife Emiline, 41, born abt 1809 in Tenn. Their children were: Robert F. age 19, Thomas P. age 14, John C. age 12, Nancy J. age 10, William T. age 8, Penelope H. age 4, America J. age 3 months, Missouri S. age 3 months, and Mahala age 21.

Recent information indicates that John and his family moved to Illinois abt 1860. Other Sanders families that were in Jackson Co., Tenn., moved to Franklin and Hamilton Co., Ill. in 1860. I checked both of those census records for 1870 and 1880 and could not find them. Any descendants of John and Emiline out there? ■

Help Marjorie Bell Find Her 'Aunt Jane' Sanders

Marjorie Bell, 2830 Chesapeake Ave., Anchorage, AK 99516, sent in this account. Although she has no blood connections to a Sanders line, she is interested in finding answers to questions raised in this story.

My grandfather, Dr. Wm. S. Robinson, was a doctor in Frostville, Ark., which no longer exists, and he had great success in treating alcoholics and “dope addicts” which in those days meant morphine because that was the strongest painkiller they had and it was readily available everywhere. Jane Sanders came to him in 1887 or early 1888 to be cured of her addiction which came because she was prescribed the drug for pain resulting from a skin cancer on her nose being eaten away by some kind of acid. Such was the sophistication of medicine at that time in her part of the country.

She was cured of her addiction, and because she had no family to return to, she stayed with the Robinsons and helped raise their daughter (my mother, born in 1888) and then stayed with my mother to help raise my brother and me. She was born in 1849, perhaps in Columbia Co., Ark. I found her there in the 1870 census living with her mother, Mary, who was born in Alabama circa 1827. Jane would have been 21 at that time. That is the extent of my knowledge of her family.

Jane had gone to school long enough to learn to read, which she did every night from her Bible, moving her finger along the lines and mouthing each word. She told of Indians coming around their cabin, and after the Civil War, when word came that Carpet Baggers were coming, her mother would take their cow and sow with piglets, all the chickens she could carry, and go down to the swamp until the danger of the livestock being stolen was past. Jane, who was around ten, was left in the cabin with a rifle across her knees to defend herself if need be. I have no doubt that she could and would have used the gun.

Aunt Jane, as she was always known to my brother and me, made a very deep impression on me which has never gone away. When she died in 1932 it was as if a blood relative had left us and she was greatly missed. If any of you are lucky enough to claim Aunt Jane and her mother as relatives, I would certainly love to hear from you. ■

John Henry Sanders - Western Tennessee To Missouri Bootheel

My g-grandfather, John Henry Sanders was born 17 Jun 1856 in Bells (Haywood/Crockett Co.), Tenn. In the 1860 Haywood Co., Tenn. census, he was listed as Henry, age 4, in the John Sanders (40) family with five siblings: Wm. H. (18); George (14); Richard (12); Joseph (7); Emma (2); and mother, Ann (22). In the 1850 Madison Co., Tenn. census, the family had included John (28); Eliza (26); William (8); George R. (6); Richard T. B. (2); and Margaret Batson (16).

Research shows that John Henry's mother was Rachel Ann Mizell/Measels who is thought to have been born in Brownsville, Tenn. (near Bells). A July 14, 1845 Haywood Co. school record shows Rachel and Thomas Mizell as students. It seems that a Mizell or Measels family lived in every west Tenn. county during the mid- 1800s, and no one has been able to piece together these families.

A Dunklin Co., Mo. history book states that the Mizell family came there after the Civil War and included the "Widow Mizell," one son, Thomas, plus five daughters: Ann who married a Sanders; Emily who married Samuel Hutchens; Jennie who married Samuel Redman; and Hannah who married Samuel Redman's twin brother, James who died; Hannah then married Marendra Harris; and Mary who must have died young.

John Henry Sanders family is said to have moved from Tenn. to Ironton (Iron Co.), Mo. where the father, John Sanders, died and was buried in an unmarked grave near Thomasville (Oregon Co.), Mo. I have not found any records to support this.

John Henry Sanders was brought to Dunklin Co., Mo. when he was a young boy, presumably with his sister, Emma. I have not located this family in the 1870 census; however, in the Dunklin Co., Mo. 1880 census, John Henry (24) was listed with his wife, Nancy M. (25), and two daughters, Inez E. (4) and Roda Belle (1). Eighteen houses away were Wm. H. Gosnell (29); wife, Emma (22) who was John Henry's sister; a daughter, Emma E. (1); and Gosnell's mother-in-law, Rachel A. Sanders (42).

While nothing more is known about

the parents of John Henry Sanders, his sister Emma, and family eventually moved to Keystone, Okla. Emma died in 1940; she and Wm. H. Gosnell are buried in the Sennet Memorial Cemetery between Sand Springs and Cleveland, Okla.

John Henry Sanders grew up in the Nesbit Community in southern Dunklin Co., Mo. where he met and married Nancy Mahalia Champ (born in Woodlawn, Jefferson Co., Ill.) on 19 Dec 1875. They had fourteen children; thirteen were girls and the last child was a boy. Three daughters died young, but the other children married into Dunklin Co., Mo. families whose descendants still reside there, to wit:

Inez Emma (1876-1938) m. Lewis Ham.

This family moved to Cass Co., Texas.

Minnie E. (1882-1957) m. William F. Dawson.

Lona, a twin, (1883-1958) m. Jerry B. Carmack.

Luna, a twin, (1883-1959) m. Isom Harrison Wilburn.

Millie Myrtle (1885-1962) m. George Washington Darden.

Rachel Rhea (1886-1960) m. Richard Albert Wilson; J.O. Balledge; W.B. Long.

Rickie Margaret (1887-1964) m. S. Erastus 'Ras' Grugett and had no children.

Nettie Pauline (1888-1968) m. James William 'Pete' Gargas.

Ida (1890-1958) m. Walter McGee. This family moved to Clay Co., Ark.

Lillie Mae (1893-1959) m. Charles Lee Pelts (these are my grandparents).

Asa Bryan (1896-1974) m. Mary Edith Smith. The only son had no children.

John Henry Sanders was a prosperous farmer and money lender who also served on the Board of Directors of a local bank. He owned several farms, one of which he gave to each of his children (except for Lillie Mae who preferred his rental homes in Kennett plus cash). After his wife died in 1929, he married Lena (last name unknown) in 1931, but this marriage ended the same year when he sought and received a divorce. Nothing more is known about Lena.

In 1931, John Henry Sanders suffered a severe stroke which paralyzed him for the remaining three years of his life. Yet, he continued to spend his summers at a camp at Thresher's Ford, near Ironton, Mo., said to have been near his childhood home. It was there that he died on 21 Jul 1934. His body was returned to

his home in Kennett (Dunklin Co.), Mo. where his funeral was held, and he was buried beside his first wife, Mahalia, in the Oak Ridge Cemetery in Kennett. According to his obituary, his half-brother, J. T. Sanders, came from Nashville, Ill. and his sister, Emma, came from Keystone, Okla. to attend the funeral.

On July 11, 1998, my husband and I hosted the first John Henry & Mahalia (Champ) Sanders Reunion in Kennett, Mo. Nine of their children also had children, each of whom was represented by descendants. While photographs and family stories were exchanged, everyone was interested in the little information I was able to provide.

I would appreciate hearing from anyone in regard to my Sanders or Mizell/Measels families, even if it is only a clue. Of course, I will gladly exchange notes with other researchers. ■

Need Connection of Elisha to Thomas Sanders in N.C.

In the last two years about ten to fifteen of us cousins from all over the U.S. have joined together and have pooled our information so that now we have identified more than 1400 descendants of Lemuel and Martha Saunders. Lemuel was born about 1740-50 and first appeared on record when he witnessed a deed in January of 1767 in what is now Lincoln Co., N.C. (A Lemuel Saunders appeared on a delinquent tax list for Augusta Co., Va. that same year but we're not sure it was the same one.) Lemuel Saunders died in 1795 leaving a widow (Martha), five sons and at least four daughters. The sons were identified in the estate settlement as Thomas, Lemuel Jr., Edward, Samuel, and Jesse. The daughters were not identified but we are sure they included Mary (No record of birth, death or marriage. Witnessed deeds and other papers along with Lemuel), Sarah (married John Self), Elizabeth (married Jacob Henry Painter) and Martha "Patsey" (married Hezekiah Beaver).

The 1400 descendants identified span the years from about 1750 to the early 1900s and I'm sure that is only a fraction of the total. We are continuing to search for more descendants along with the parents of Lemuel and Martha Saunders. There are some researchers who believe that Lemuel's parents could be Thomas and Juduth? Saunders. Thomas was a descendant of the Edward Saunders who came to Virginia in 1635 on the ship "Safety." Thomas married Juduth about 1742 and, after selling land he inherited from his father in 1755, moved to southern Maryland. We have not, as of yet, found anything about his family after that move. Any help would be greatly appreciated.

Another set of twins by descendants of Henry Sanders and Pica Blake—they are Larissa Jean and Abaigale Marie Sanders, born February 7, 1994, in Indiana, daughters of Jason Daniel Sanders and Dawn Michelle Glasser Sanders. Jason is an eight generation descendant of the above.

Recently spent much time in Indiana and met many cousins I had not met before, over 100 of them and they as well as others will appear in the tree. Of particular interest was the visit to Vernal Cemetery outside Bloomington, Indiana which is where 32 or more immediate family members are buried. They include Henry and Dica as well as many of their children and grandchildren.

There are also Mayfields and Martins in the cemetery which also were related through marriage. The cemetery is now in private hands and has recently been fenced to keep the cattle out and many of the headstones have been broken. The boundaries are in dispute between two current owners. The DAR wanted to fence and upkeep but because of the land dispute the cemetery was fenced only. Henry Sanders was a Revolutionary War Veteran and a Baptist minister for forty years and was instrumental in establishing six to eight churches in Monroe, and Bartholomew Counties.

The original Mayfield was instrumental in the founding of the normal school and it later became the University of Indiana. One of Henry's children or a grandchild was also one of the first trustees of the university. ■
