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## Get The Most Out Of Your Library Visits; Ask Questions

In the last issue I had a few things to say about people who try to do all of their genealogy research on the computer. I emphasized the fact that you need to use all the tools available to you. The computer is just one of them.

Genealogy libraries or the genealogy section of your university or public library has a wealth of information, some of which you may not find without some help. Most libraries will have staff on duty, even volunteer staff, who are very willing and capable of helping if you only ask.

Besides letting them know what surnames and locations you are searching, here are two things that you should ask for, particularly outside your hometown in counties where your ancestors have resided.

Ask if there is record kept on researchers who have visited that library and have indicated the surname for which they are searching. Not all libraries keep such a record, but I know some do. For me they have been a very valuable source of persons searching the very family for which I needed information. An address and phone number is customarily a part of that record.

Another thing to ask for is a vertical file (usually kept by surname). This may have miscellaneous small files, surname newsletters, and all kinds of stuff. [See page four of this issue for an example of what can be found in a vertical file.]

Just remember that you need to ask for information. Don't be afraid to show your ignorance. Make your time in the library count. ■

## Rev. Moses Sanders of England Lived In Virginia, North Carolina, and Georgia

The following was taken from the Walter R. Sanders Genealogy Collection in the Litchfield, Illinois, Public Library. It was on pages 164-165 of the volume titled *Sanders/Saunders of Alabama, Georgia, Mississippi*. The source of the information is not given, but Mr. Sanders listed names and addresses of several researchers who were working on this line. They are listed at the end of this article. Their addresses are about 40 years old, but may be helpful.

### REV. MOSES SANDERS OF FRANKLIN COUNTY, GEORGIA

Rev. Moses Sanders, Baptist preacher, from England, 1765, with two younger brothers, David and John, who located in Tennessee and Alabama, while he settled at Petersburg, Virginia. He later moved to North Carolina, encouraged education, established a school, planted churches, and laid out highways from the Carolinas to Alabama and to Indian reservations north of the Chattahoochee River in Georgia. He and his brother took part in the Revolutionary War, participating in the Battles of King's Mountain, North Carolina, Cowpens, South Carolina, the long campaigns in Virginia and the fierce guerrilla warfare in the Carolinas. In battle of King's Mountain received a sabre wound on the side of his face while engaged in a hand-to-hand conflict with a British officer, a scar from which he carried to his grave.

After the war (probably about 1799), Rev. Moses Sanders and family settled on Grove River, in Franklin, now Banks County, Georgia. He was the founder and first pastor of the Line, Grove Level, and Nails Creek Baptist Churches in Franklin County.

He was born during 1742 in England; married Sallie Hamilton. He died during 1817 in Franklin County, now Banks County, and was buried in the family cemetery on the road from Maysville to Bushville in what is now the southern

part of Banks County. His will dated Feb. 28, 1817, probated May, 1817, is on file in Cornesville, Franklin County, Georgia. In it he names:

wife, Mary; sons John, Moses, Aaron, Joel, and David (deceased).

to Jones and Joel Sanders part of 400 acre tract granted to self, adjoining Aldred's old cabin.

to Aaron's children: namely: Nancy, Jones, Joel, Moses, Nathaniel, Daniel, Polly, Sally.

to grandchildren, the children of David Sanders, deceased, namely: Martin, Sally, Nancy and David, Hambleton.

daughter Sally Hooper and her children: William, Sanders, Obediah, Betsy, Carter, Milly and James Hooper.

to Richard Mauldin \$2

Executors sons Moses and John Sanders. Witnesses: William Legg, John Baugh. Codicil: That the portion of David Sanders' children be in trust of son John.

The epitaph on the tombstone of Rev. Moses Sanders is:

REV. MOSES SANDERS  
BORN  
IN ENGLAND 1742  
DIED 1817

FOUNDER OF GROVE LEVEL, NAILS CREEK AND MANY OTHER BAPTIST CHURCHES. A SOLDIER OF THE REVOLUTIONARY WAR THE CROSS OF JESUS CHRIST MY ANCHOR.

The epitaph on the tombstone of the wife of Rev. Moses Sanders who was buried near him, is:

Moses served as juror in Franklin County, Georgia in 1801.

## Irvin Sanders Needs Information About His Great Grandfather, Elijah Sanders, b. 1825

Dartmouth Ave., Englewood, CO 80110, is seeking information about the parents of Elijah Sanders, her g-g-grandfather, and any information on children of his first marriage; and the first three listed (below) children of his second marriage, and other possible children. Her father has extensive information on Elljah's last five children listed and will be glad to share it with anyone interested.

Elijah Sanders was born 18 Dec 1825, possibly in Gibson County, Dyer County or Bedford County, Tennessee, or Kentucky or North Carolina.

He married Mary Jane Wynne, daughter of Wilson Wynne, in Gibson Co., Tenn. in 1846. Bondsman was a Pleasant Sanders. 1860 census of Lamar County, Texas, shows Elijah's mother's first name as Mary. Elijah's children with Mary Jane were Mary (born 1847 in Tenn.); John W. (born 1849 In Tenn.); Nancy Emline (born 1851 in Tenn.); Pleasant O. (born 1853 in Texas); James K. (born 1855 in Texas); William Carroll (born 1858 in Texas); and Elijah (born 1860 in Texas). On 1 Dec 1863 Elijah Sanders married his second wife, Arsulie Catherine Coats, in Collin Co., Texas. They lived in Lamar Co., Texas, until about 1891. Probable children of this marriage include: Emma (?); S. T. (Tennie?) (1865); and C(laude) L(amar) T(obe?) (1867). Known children include: Effie Jane (1870); Robert Lee (1872); Thomas B. (1878); Etta May (1881); Verna Ray (1884); and Ruby Laura (1890). They moved to Jones Co., Texas, in about 1891.

The youngest daughter, Ruby, said

that she was the youngest of Eljah's 21 children so there were several whose names are not known, and they probably died young.

Robert Lee was my g-grandfather. He married Louisa Amanda Morrow 9 Oct 1895 in Jones Co., Texas. They lived there the remainder of their lives. Their children: unnamed boys born and died 1896 and 1897; Robert Earl (1898); Irvin Morrow (1900); Selma Catherine (1903); Clyde (1905); Cloyde (1905); and Willie Lee (1909). My grandfather, Irvin Morrow Sanders, married my grandmother, Mary Tula Carlton 15 July 1918 in Jones Co., Texas. ■

## Know About Sanders In White Oak Community In South Alabama?

My maternal grandmother was Laura Jane Sanders, who was born in or near the White Oak Community, which is about five miles south of Eufaula in Barbour County, Ala. All that is left of the old community today is the White Oak United Methodist Church and cemetery. Laura married Lemuel M. Walden. Some of their children are buried in the White Oak UMC cemetery. Six of their children lived to adulthood: Foy, Emmett Sanders, Ernest, Pearl, Daisy Lee, and Ethel Mae. Laura and Lem moved to the Rehobeth area, some five miles south of Dothan and settled. He became a prominent farmer in the area, and owned a sawmill, a blacksmith shop, and a small rural grocery store. They were active in the Piney Grove UMC, and are buried in its cemetery along with all three of the daughters who lived to adulthood as well as several grandchildren.

My mother was Daisy Lee Walden (1896-1965), who married Fleming "Flem" Pullum (1889-1976) from the Malvern community some five miles west of Rehobeth. I am the youngest of their five children, and one of two still alive. I live in the last house Lem and Laura had in Rehobeth. ## Identifying Old Photographs

Photographs can be identified as to time periods by determining the type you possess. There are several types including:

1. THE DAGUERREOTYPE, 1839-1857. It was invented by L.J.M. Daguerre in 1837. It is the oldest of commercially made photographs. It is a positive picture that has a shiny mirror-like appearance. It has a fragile silver surface on a copper plate. They were once enclosed in a case and they still need protection.

2. AMBROTYPE, 1852-1863. It was invented by Archer and Frye in 1851. This is a positive on glass and will have a coating of red or black paper or cloth behind the glass. These were also enclosed in cases.

3. MELAINOTYPES, FERROTYPES OR TINTYPES, 1856-20th Century. These were positives. These were not shiny like daguerreotypes, nor like on glass, but were an image on metal. They may be in cases, paper frames, wall frames, albums or just loose. If they are pasted in paper frames or slipped into cases they may be earlier. If the pose is formal, the earlier the time. Tintypes were taken in numbers at fairs and amusement parks.

Look for a photographer's name on the back of the pasted-on paper. Do compare the clothing fashions for an era time clue.

4. THE CARTE DE VISITS, 1859-1914, invented by Disderi in 1854. These were the first paper photographs, 2-1/2 x 4-1/4 inches in size and called visiting cards. The earlier ones were thinner and the later ones heavier and thicker. It was discontinued in the U.S. by the turn of the century but continued in Great Britain and Scandinavia. (If it was a tin-type or Carte de Vista, it might have a revenue stamp on the back. This clue indicates the picture was taken during the Civil War.)

5. THE CABINET PORTRAIT, 1866-1914, was invented by Window in 1866. This was a negative 4-1/2 x 6-1/2 and found in albums and wall frames. Study fashions for the time period. If the photograph is in an oval pasted on card or if it is surrounded by dark grey or a black mount, it was probably made after 1900.

6. THE POSTCARD, 1905-1930. These were very popular and sometimes were mailed. Look for the postmark.

Nathaniel's son, my line, Thomas Carroll Sanders, b. 12 Nov. 1795/1796 in Greensboro, Guilford Co., N.C.; d. 28 Nov. 1870 in Pike Co., Ala.; burial: Kendrick Cemetery, Troy, Pike Co., Ala. married Martha Louise "Polly" Cadenhead 9 Jan 1817 in Jones Co., Ga.

(This generation moved through Jones Co., Ga. to Talbot Co., Ga., and on to Troy, Pike Co., Ala., where the subsequent generations remained—except one, my g-g-grandfather, who moved to Texas.) ■

## Joseph Sanders and Wife, Sarah Fritts, Moved To Several States

The following was found in a vertical file in the Fayetteville (Ark.) Public Library and published as part of a publication titled *Potpourri*. Possibly written about 1982.

Sarah "Sally" Fritts, first born child of Henry (abt 1794) and his first wife Lucy Jane (maiden name unknown) was b. 30 May 1815 in Lee Co., Va. By 1831 the family lived in Monroe Co., Ind. where Sally met Joseph Sanders and married him on 17 July 1831, when she was 16 and he was 18 years old.

Joseph was a grandson of Henry Sanders, Sr. who fought in the Revolutionary War with the So. Carolina Militia. After the War he became a Baptist minister and moved his family to N. Carolina, then Kentucky and finally to Indiana. The Sanders family is first recorded in Quaker records as living in N. Carolina in the mid-1700s. Their European origin has not been determined but was probably English.

Sally and Jo moved to Washington Co, Ark. in 1857. During the Civil War Battle of Pea Ridge they were caught between Union and Rebel forces and lost most of their possessions but escaped with their lives and returned to Indiana.

Sally's husband, known as "Squire Jo," kept a diary from 1856 to 1880. In it he revealed the family's torn loyalties between North and South in that War. They were pro-Union but also proslavery and anti-Lincoln. They felt safer in the north where there was no bushwhackers, although there was a draft.

During the War they lived briefly in Illinois, then back to Indiana and finally decided to go to "the western ocean." A few days before the end of the War they left for Washington Territory, where they settled in Walla Walla Co., near the town of Dixie. Both are buried on their property in what is now a hillside wheat field. Sally died 27 Nov 1878, some 12 years before her husband.

Their children:

1. John, b. 26 Aug 1832 in Monroe Co, Ind; d. 3 Feb 1908 in Walla Walla Co., Wash; m. Rebecca Ann Meredith, 17 Dec 1854 in Monroe Co, Ind. Rebecca was b. 3 Nov 1832 in Butler Co, Ohio and d. 31 Mar 1911 in Walla Walla, Wash. She was the daughter of James and Ann Meredith. John and Rebecca were farmers and had 7 chil-

dren: Sarah Jane, b. 1856; Anna Elizabeth, born 1858; Joseph Henry, b. 1861; Lydia Utah, b. 1865; James Sylvester, b. 1868; Jerome Albert, b. 1871; and Francis Marion, b. 1873.

Lydia was born during the trip west in Utah Territory, thus her middle name. She was the writer's grandmother. All of these children have living descendants.

2. Henry, b. 26 Oct 1834; d. 23 Dec 1836.

3. Lucy Jane, called "Jane," b. 8 May 1837 in Monroe Co, Ind.; d. 10 Feb 1921 at Walla Walla, Wash.; m. Lewis H. Goodwin, 23 Dec 1866. "Doc" Goodwin, as he was called, was b. 13 Aug 1818 in Putman Co, Ind.; d. 8 Mar 1879 in Walla Walla Co., Wash. He was a son of John Goodwin and Annie Heddie. Doc was an accomplished physician who did early cancer research, as well as a wagon master on the trip west. Doc and Jane had five children. Lemuel C. "Monks," born 1868; Lewis Cass, b. 1869; Priscilla, b. before 1874; Sarah Jane, b. 1874; and Joseph W., b. ? Only Cass and Sarah Jane are known to have had descendants. Joseph fought in the Spanish-American War.

4. Priscilla, b. 25 Sept 1839 in Monroe Co., Ind.; d. there 28 June 1840.

5. Susannah, b. 9 May 1841 in Monroe Co., Ind.; d. 7 Mar 1874 in Walla Walla Co., Wash.; m. George Smith 10 Mar 1867. George's background is unknown. He d. abt 1876 in Walla Walla Co., Wash. They had 3 children: Martha Jane, b. 1868; Sarah Ann, b. 1870; and Walter, b. 1872. All had descendants. The parents both died while the children were young.

6. Nancy Malinda, b. 10 Sep 1843 in Monroe Co., Ind.; d. 1 June 1920 at Walla Walla, Wash.; m. Andrew J. Fix 13 Oct 1867. "Jack" Fix was named for Pres. Andrew Jackson. He was b. 18 Jun 1841 in Bellaire, Ohio; d. 15 Dec 1923 at Walla Walla, Wash. His father was David Fix. They were farmers and had 8 children, all of which received college educations: Roderick Rochester, b. 1868; Wayne Wright, b. 1870; Arminda Lucinda, b. 1872; Milam Bertram, b. 1875; Thomas Weldon, b. 1877; Mabel, b. 1880; Maude, Mabel's twin; and Jacob Earl, b. 1882. Mabel died not surviving infancy. Arminda, a spinster, was a librarian for 50 years. Four Fix grandchildren, together with four of their

cousins—all girls—died in a house fire in Palouse, Wash. in 1908. There are few surviving descendants.

7. George Wesley, b. 17 Mar 1846 in Monroe Co., Ind.; d. 13 Mar 1925 at Dixie, Wash.; m. Roxie E. Pettibone, 15 Jan 1874. "Jennie," as she was known, was b. 17 Oct 1855; d. 7 Dec 1914. Nothing is known of her family but she is supposed to have weighted some 300 pounds. George and Jennie had 8 children the first 4 of which died quite young and whose names are not known. The others were: Jessie J., b. 1881; Bert Fritz, b. ?; Glen Wesley, b. ?; and May, b. ?. The last 4 all left descendants.

8. Sarah Elizabeth, b. 30 Sept 1848 in Monroe Co, Ind.; d. 23 Aug 1872 in Walla Walla Co., Wash. Sarah, as she was called, m. John J. Rohn, 30 Sept 1866. John was b. in 1835 in Baden, Germany; d. in 1922 in Walla Walla Co., Wash. He had a colorful life in the post Civil War Army, fighting Indians in the west. His parents were Nicholas Rohn and Kate (cipf) (sic). John and Sarah were farmers and had 4 children: Nancy Katherine "Date," b. 1867; Malina Jane, b. 1869; Joseph Fredrick, b. 1871; and Sarah J, b. ? All but Sarah survived to adulthood and left descendants. The mother died when the children were still small and John never remarried.

9. James Madison, b. 29 Nov 1850 (twin) in Monroe Co., Ind.; named for Pres. James Madison; d. 192? at Deer Park, Wash.; m. Henrietta Chandler 16 Nov 1879. Pherbe Henrietta Chandler's birth date is unknown; d. 1928. She is believed to have been related to Gen./Pres. U. S. Grant and to the Kennedy family. James and Henrietta were farmers and had 7 children: Mabel, b. abt 1882; Bessie Oliver, b. 1889; Edna Ellen, b. 1891; Leota Maud, b. 1903; Roy, b. abt 1895; Clarence, b. ?; and Raymond Arthur, b. 1898. Mabel, Roy and Clarence did not have children but the others left descendants. Maud is still living in 1982, and is the only surviving grandchild of Joseph and Sally (Fritz) Sanders.

10. Joseph A. Wright, b. 29 Nov 1850 (twin) in Monroe Co., Ind.; d. 19 Jan 1855 in Monroe Co., Ind.

11. Mary Catherine, b. 20 July 1853 in Monroe Co., Ind.; d. 27 July 1853 there.

12. Franklin Pierce, b. 26 Aug 1854 in Monroe Co., Ind.; d. 21 Jan 1886 in Walla Walla Co., Wash. Named for the 14th President; m. Emma Pettibone, sister of Jennie. Emma was b. 8 Apr 1860 at Sacramento, Calif.; d. 1948 at Walla Walla, Wash. Franklin and Emma had only 2 children: the first, name unknown, b. and d. before 1880; Perry Leroy, b. 1882. He, in turn, had only one child.

11. Claborn Fritz, b. 3 Dec 1857 in Washington Co., Ark.; d. in Walla Walla Co., Wash.; m. Lenne Green, b. abt 1860. They had 3 children: William, b. abt 1882; Nellie, b. abt 1884; and Sadie. None of these left descendants.

Sally's life was one of unbelievable hardship by today's standards. First, she helped to raise her younger siblings. Then, married at 16, she had a flock of her own. Her married life was one of many movings by cumbersome, work-making covered wagon train. They arrived penniless, sick of mind and body, and homeless in a new land in the fall of 1865 and barely managed to survive the first winter. It is little wonder that her body gave up in its 64th year.

Joseph Sanders' diary still survives in the Penrose Library at Whitman College in Walla Walla. Many descendants have copies. [Editor's note: there is a copy of this diary in Mullins Library at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville.] From the Fritts family standpoint it suffers for lack of information about that line. Jo was, unfortunately, concerned only with himself.

Sanders, Elizabeth's father, born in Tenn. Francis M. Sanders, b. abt 1834-36 and Amanda E. Warren, b. 17 Nov 1836, married at Dyersburg, Dyer County, Tenn. about 1856-57. They moved soon after the marriage to Bethesda, Independence Co., Ark. Francis M. Sanders was killed in the Civil War about 1863 in Ark. Amanda and Francis had five children: Celica Ann, b. 1857, married George Minish; John Henry Sanders, b. 20 Apr 1858, d. 4 Feb 1941; Asenith Jane, b. 8 Jan 1860, d. 5 Apr 1945; Elizabeth Jo, b. 19 Mar 1862, d. 23 Jul 1894 in Independence Co., Ark., married Joseph Brown Bland 15 Feb 1883; and the last child Elizabeth's twin, James I., who died when he was about 12 years of age. 1880 US Ark. Census lists Amanda Sanders, Washington Twp., Independence Co., with two of her children, John H. (22) and Lizzie (18) as well as her uncle, Johnson Wright (78) born in Tenn. Amanda moved to Texola, Okla. 2 Jan 1907 on a train with her daughter, Asenith Jane Sanders Blair, and Asenith's children. Amanda had only two children living at this time—John Henry Sanders, who moved to Texola with his wife Margaret Elizabeth Terrell in 1905, and Asenith Jane Sanders Blair. ■

## Just Who Is This Ben F. Sanders Who Appears On the Census in Sabine, Coounty, Texas?

Ben F. Sanders was born about 1843 in Alabama. He appears on the 1880 and 1900 census of Sabine County, Texas. In 1880 he has a wife named Lecester, age 35, born in Georgia, and the following children: Mattie, 9, born in Georgia; William, 5, born in Texas; Garnet E., 4, Texas; Emma L, 3, Texas; and Ben F., 2, Texas. There is also an infant child named John T. Sanders with the notation "n. r." by his name (no relation?). On August 2, 1909 B. F. Sanders filed a petition for a Confederate pension in Sabine County, Texas. In the affidavit he stated the following about his life: that he was 66 years old, was born in Alabama, resided in the town of Geneva, and was a farmer by occupation. He stated that his unit was organized in Georgia and that he served from April 1862 until 1865 in Company I, 3rd Georgia Cavalry as a private. The affi-

davit was witnessed by W.W. Horn and Lewis S. Williams who stated "we served in the same regiment with B.F. Sanders and know that he never deserted his post of duty but was a true soldier and served from the time of his enlistment until the close of the war 1865." A later report from the Adjutant General's Office in support of the pension states that he served from "May 16, 1862 and that he was one of a number of prisoners paroled May 16, 1865, at Charlotte, North Carolina." A certificate attached to the petition stated that Ben Sanders had real and personal property worth \$982 at the time of his application. A subsequent notarized statement in 1914 when Ben Sanders applied for a raise in his pension stated that he was at that time "physically disabled from earning his living by labor."

I have been unable to connect Ben Sanders to any other Sanders in North Carolina, Alabama, or Georgia. I hope this information helps someone else in their research. ■

## Need Info About Robert Sanders of New York?

This came from Dorothy Hughes, 23230 Date Ave., Torrance, CA 90505. In August 1999, my husband and I were in the Mohawk Valley of New York looking for some of my ancestors. We went to Stone Arabia in search of my Dutch (6th) great-grandfather, William Coppernoll. I don't think there is a connection between this Robert Sanders and my husband's Sanders line, but I thought someone researching Sanders may find him interesting.

At the Dutch Reformed Church of Stone Arabia, we found information about a Robert Sanders who may have helped the Palatine Germans acquire the Stone Arabia Land Patent in 1723. The information said Robert Sanders was an Indian interpreter for Governor Flecther in the late 1600s. He had a farm in the Hudson Valley called "Steen Arabia" and that may have been the source of the name Stone Arabia for the Palatines' Patent.

The next day I bought a book called *In Mohawk Country, Early Narratives About A Native People*. In the *Journal Of A Voyage To New York And A Tour In Several Of The American Colonies In*

1679-1680 by Jasper Danckaerts, I found Robert Sanders mentioned again. He acted as a guide to Jasper Danckaerts through the Mohawk Valley. He is described as a long-time resident of the area and local expert on the Mohawks.

I went to the Family History Center when I returned home and looked up Robert Sanders. I found a Robert Sanders who was born in New Amsterdam, New York about 1641. His father, Thomas, was born in Holland. He also had a daughter, Elizabeth. Jasper Danckaerts mentioned in his "Journal" that Robert Sanders' oldest daughter was Elizabeth. ■
